It's *BUDGET* time again! Each department has been busy reviewing current expenses versus the budget and then figuring out what is needed for the next fiscal year. Each department must account for program increases, new programs, State mandates, software, supplies, etc. The information is given to the Selectmen to review and then to the Board of Finance. The income side of the budget is



usually the trickiest to predict especially with the uncertainty of State funding and its impact on Warren. Still, our Finance Board and Selectmen work together to keep the budget expenses and the mill rate to the very lowest possible amount without hurting programs, customer services, and our infrastructure. From the Assessor's Office



HOMEOWNERS BENEFIT PROGRAM

Applications for property tax credit for elderly or totally disabled homeowners are available at the Assessor's office. To qualify, a homeowner must meet the following criteria:

The home for which the credit is being sought must be the homeowner's primary residence. The homeowner must have owned the home on or before October 1, 2017.

A homeowner must have reached the age of 65 by the end of 2017, although totally disabled homeowners are eligible regardless of age.

The income limits are \$35,300 for single applicants and \$43,000 combined income for married applicants.

Proof of all income for 2017 must be provided. If an applicant files an Income Tax Return, a full copy must be provided with copies of all 1099's. If an applicant receives Social Security benefits, a copy of the SSA 1099 form must be provided.



RENTERS RELIEF PROGRAM

Applications for elderly or totally disabled renters who wish to apply for the Renters Relief Program are available at the Warren Assessor's office . To qualify, a renter must meet the following criteria:

A renter must have reached the age of 65 by December 31, 2017. A disabled renter must have reached the age of 18 by December 31, 2017.

A renter must be a permanent resident of Warren.

A renter must meet the maximum income requirement of \$43,000 for a married couple or \$35,300 for a single person.

The filing period is April 1 through October 1. An applicant must provide proof of income received in 2017. If an applicant has filed an income tax return and/or received an SSA 1099 from Social Security, a copy must be provided.

An applicant must submit proof of payment made for rent and utility services for 2017.

ADDITIONAL VETERAN'S EXEMPTION

Applications for the Additional Veteran's Exemption are available in the Assessor's office. To qualify, you must be considered a resident of Warren and your DD214 must be on file with the Warren Town Clerk no later than September 30, 2018. The income limits are \$35,300 for single applicants and \$43,000 combined income for married applicants.



Proof of all income for 2017 must be provided. If you file an Income Tax Return, a Copy must be provided. If you receive Social Security benefits, a copy(s) of your SSA 1099 must be provided. Veterans disability payments are not considered income for this program.

Income limits for veterans with a 100% disability rating are \$18,000 for single individuals and \$21,000 for married couples. In this case, Social Security benefits are not considered income.

Social Services Office



Energy Assistance:

This is an income and asset qualification based program that provides heating fuel assistance to Connecticut residents. *Even if you completed an application last year, you must re-apply again for this year's program.* To make an appointment or to determine if you qualify for the Energy Assistance Program, please contact Samantha Sommerer at Warren Social Services, 860-868-7881 samantha.sommerer@caawc.org

Reminders:

The last day to submit a fuel bill for payment is March 31st.

The Energy Assistance program ends May 1st. Please be sure to make an appointment before the end of the program!

Income Tax Preparation Assistance:

AARP Foundation Tax Aide offers free tax preparation help to anyone age 50 or older that cannot afford a tax preparation service. IRS—certified volunteers, provide one-on-one tax preparation assistance at area locations. It is 101 acres in size, with 82 acres in West Hartford and 19 acres in Hartford. Because of its garden, is has been called the "Flower of New England Parks." The rose garden is the heart and soul of the park and is the first public rose garden in the country, opened in 1904. Elizabeth Park is listed on the National Register of Historical Places



Land Use Office

At this time of year, with the retreat of winter and the beginning of spring, very often one of the first desires of a lakefront property owner is the creation or maintenance of a sand beach area at their lakefront. However, lakefront property owners may not be aware that sand beaches are usually not a naturally occurring feature of inland lakes in Connecticut. Creating and maintaining a sandy beach where one did not naturally exist can adversely affect water quality. Man-made beaches typically require periodic sand replenishment, as over time sand drifts into a water body. While the sand is then gone from view, it has not left the lake. Beach sand



contributes to the sediment load in a lake, filling the lake in over time. In addition, beach sand deposits can lead to decreased water clarity, increased weed growth, and can negatively impact lake wildlife all along the food chain.

With this in mind, the Town of Warren Inland Wetlands Commission adopted guidelines last summer that are intended to serve as a general guide for the Town of Warren and private owners of *existing* sand beaches. Their purpose in doing so was to provide guidelines for maintaining beaches in a manner that will allow for the enjoyment and safety of the users and the protection of the environment in a cost-effective manner.

Lakefront residents should be aware that the creation of new sand beaches is not encouraged by the Town of Warren Inland Wetlands Commission, and it is likely that any proposal to create a new sand beach will be determined by the Commission to be a significant activity. A significant activity requires a public hearing and submission of information regarding alternatives which would cause less or no environmental impact to wetlands or watercourses as well as why the alternative set forth in the application was chosen and other alternatives were considered neither feasible nor prudent.

Prior to maintenance of existing sand beach areas, the owner should contact the Town of Warren Inland Wetlands Enforcement Officer for a site inspection. The purpose of the inspection is to determine if any other actions need to be undertaken prior to maintenance of the beach area. Other actions may include resolving ongoing erosion problems, revegetation, or general cleanup. Owners of property on Lake Waramaug are also encouraged to contact the Lake Waramaug Taskforce for their input and suggestions.

The Town of Warren Inland Wetlands Commission generally prefers that owners of properties with existing sand beaches reclaim from the lakebed any sand that had previously been installed on the property. Reclamation may take place only after all applicable permits are obtained. That being said, the Town of Warren Inland Wetlands Commission recognizes that there may be *rare* instances when sand replenishment, in addition to or instead of, sand reclamation is considered necessary. As deposition of sand at the lakefront is a regulated activity per the Inland Wetlands regulations, a permit is required from the Inland Wetlands Commission prior to the placement of sand at the lakefront. Refer to the *Best Management Practices* document for additional requirements if you are considering a reclamation or replenishment project.

Lakefront property owners should also be aware that dredging, the operation of removing sand from below the normal waterline and placing it back on the beach area may require permits from the Warren Inland Wetlands Commission, the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, and the US Army Corps of Engineers. Beach owners should assume that local, state, and federal environmental permits are required for dredging unless confirmed otherwise in writing. Dredging may take place only after all applicable permits are obtained.

The document also contains information regarding routine maintenance of lakefronts, seasonal controls to prevent the loss of beach sand into a water body, and helpful resources for shoreline stabilization projects. The *Best Management Practices* document is designed to be a helpful resource for lakefront property owners, providing permitting procedural explanations, project requirements, and additional resources property owners can use as they plan their lakefront improvement projects.
