



Affordable Housing Committee

Since the 1970's, the town of Warren and many of its residents have identified the need to create affordable housing options. Early on the focus was on the need for housing for the community's aged population. As the cost of housing increased in Litchfield County, so did the need for providing affordable opportunities for young adults and families.

Warren Affordable Housing was incorporated in 1990 and acquired 501 C (3) status in 1992. The members of this committee, hardworking and dedicated, spent many years working to bring a project to fruition with

funding being an insurmountable barrier to this process. In the years that followed, members passed away and those that remained became discouraged.

In the fall of 2014, an informational meeting was held and a new invigorated committee was established comprised of former and new members. This determined group of town residents and friends of the Warren community are committed to providing affordable housing options within the town. Warren Affordable Housing Corporation meets at Warren Town Hall on the third Tuesday of each month.

Charter Oak Pass – Life Use



The Charter Oak Pass provides access to the State Parks and Forests at no cost to Connecticut residents, age 65 or older.

The pass is accepted at day use areas where a parking fee applies. Presenting the pass allows for free access to the vehicle and its passengers. The pass holder does not have to be the vehicle driver.

Free admittance also is provided for the pass holder when visiting Gillette Castle and Dinosaur or Fort Trumbull State Parks. Passes are non-transferable and are not valid for camping or special events.





Are Wetlands in YOUR Backvard? ~Part One~

What are wetlands?

In broad terms, wetlands are simply lands that are wet. They have water at or near the surface of the ground for a portion of the growing season. Some wetlands are only wet for part of the year and others are continually wet. Many wetlands serve as the important transitional areas between dry lands and deeper aquatic systems, like rivers and lakes; others may be isolated within upland areas. Swamps, marshes, and bogs are some of the most commonly known wetland types. You can find wetlands in forests, you can find wetlands along coastal shorelines and salt marshes, and you can find wetlands bordering streams, rivers and lakes. You can even find wetlands in your own backyard. Wetlands support both terrestrial and aquatic species of plants and animals. Wetlands are highly productive, unique ecosystems that support the streams flowing on or near your property, which flow on to waterbodies. These ecosystems are important to the sustainability and health of your community, as well as your envilarger ronment.



The Value of Wetlands

Wetlands perform critical functions that directly impact the quality of life that you enjoy. Most wetlands help with:

Flooding & Water Purification Wetlands often help reduce flooding. They may temporarily store flood water and slowly release it, preventing flooding of your property--often your basement. Wetland plants are specially adapted to stressful conditions and serve to slow storm water, ultimately protecting adjacent and downstream properties from flood damage by diffusing large storm flows and slowing the momentum of the rushing water. Wetlands may slowly release excess water into groundwater systems below or pass it into nearby streams.

Erosion Control & Sediment Trapping Wetland vegetation slows storm water flow rates, settling excessive sediments loaded with pollutants from the land (nonpoint source pollution) and preventing soil erosion from your property. "Studies have shown

that as much as 80-90% of sediments in the water column may be removed as they move through wetlands" (www.epa.gov/NE/ students/teacher/world.html). Sediment poses a significant threat to water--both drinking water resources and non-drinking sources, including streams and lakes. Sediments can fill in water bodies, smothering fish spawning areas and bottom-dwelling aquatic life. Sediments are prime candidates for transporting pollutants from our homes and communities.

Providing Habitat Wetlands provide food, shelter, nesting areas and escape cover for a variety of mammals, amphibians, reptiles and birds. Some species simply would cease to exist without wetlands, which are one of the most biologically fertile and diverse landscapes on Earth. Amphibians may spend most of their lives in uplands, but they depend on wetlands for breeding. Vernal pools, a type of seasonal wetland, provide this safe breeding area that is void of predator fish. The US EPA reports that up to 45% of rare and endangered plant or animal species rely to some extent on wetlands.

Human Enjoyment Hunting and fishing remain sports that are dependent on wetlands. You can also enjoy hiking, birdwatching, and photography in wetland areas. Frogs, turtles, and interesting insects can tantalize the curiosity of your children. You can enjoy kayaking and canoeing in open waters abutting wetlands. Wetlands simply provide an escape from the stress and demands of everyday life.

How Do I Affect Wetlands?

Human activities have destroyed over half of all U.S. wetlands. Historically, wetlands were viewed as mosquito-infested wastelands. They were drained for agricultural use, filled for housing developments and industrial complexes, or used as dumping sites for household and hazardous wastes. Presently swing sets, sandboxes, gardens and sheds tend to damage wetlands located on private properties. Homeowners may be unaware that their home is near, or that their property includes, wetland areas. Property owners may then unknowingly proceed to clear trees, plant gardens, add sheds, install pools or patios, etc. This encroaches on wetland areas and affects their functioning. Although small encroachments on your property may seem insignificant, the cumulative resulting from your actions and the actions of your neighbors can be detrimental. impact


June 30th – Munch and a Movie at noon Bring your lunch bag and come and enjoy the movie, *"The Artist"*

The Warren Land Trust is an advocacy group dedicated to the preservation of the rural character of Warren. Our mission is to preserve farmland, open space, natural and endangered resources such as wetlands, forests and wildlife habitats, to encourage outright gifting of land for permanent protection and the use of conservation easements to preserve open space.

This fall, the Warren Land Trust was pleased to acquire a new fee property and a new easement, both located in iconic view shed areas in town. The Strong Preserve, purchased with the assistance of a consortium of conservation-minded neighbors, consists of 53 acres on Above All Road. The wooded area includes one of the highest points in Warren. With the pro bono assistance of Bill Pollack and Arbor Services of Connecticut, Dave Schneiderbeck and other WLT board members are blazing a trail on the property. Stay tuned for news of its opening! We are also pleased to serve as stewards of a 9-acre conservation easement on Tanner Hill Road, for which we are grateful to Susan Bates.

In addition to new properties, we continue to inspect and maintain the pristine character of our fee properties and easements. Board members new and old have engaged in hands-on stewardship training, most notably at a recent workshop sponsored by UConn's Center for Land Use Education and Research on using smart-phone GPS technology to inspect properties, cut trails, and more. We look forward to putting this knowledge to practical use in the forest and fields.

In arenas beyond land acquisition and stewardship, we held our Annual Meeting this past November, at which we welcomed three new members to our Board of Directors. See our Fall 2015 newsletter (now on our website) for more information on the meeting and new board members. WLT members turned out in force again this year for Warren Parks & Rec's annual Earth Day Town Clean-up. Finally, we recently participated for the second time in the Connecticut Community Foundation's "Give Local" fundraising campaign. This year was even more successful than the last, as we had more donors and raised more funds for stewardship and programming than we had last year. We are grateful for our community's generosity!

Upcoming WLT activities:

<u>CT Trails Day Hike</u>, Saturday, 6/4, 10am (rain date Sunday, June 5th, 10am) - We will hike along Fiddlers Pond, a 3-mile loop over moderate terrain with some elevation and stream crossings. Board member and Outdoor Wilderness School instructor Dave Schneiderbeck will lead us, pointing out areas and items of interest. Dress for the weather, with appropriate footwear. Bring the kids (recommended for ages 5 and up); dogs on leash are permitted. Park at Warren Woods.

<u>Heritage Hike</u>, Saturday 9/24, 10am-noon – Indulge your enjoyment of the great outdoors and your curiosity about our local history at the same time! In partnership with the Warren Historical Society, we will walk the Coords Preserve, donated to the WLT in 2005 by former Town Clerk Priscilla Coords and her children. We are working with the WHS to determine the finer points of what promises to be a collaboration enjoyable for all. Details forthcoming on our website and Facebook page.
